Dear Members of the Dana Ward,

Missionary Mailbox

Elder Caleb T. Oldner (Argentina, Resistencia Mission) AV. Rivadavia 323 Resistencia, Chaco Argentina

As a 'trainer', I have had 5 new companions to train, three of which have been 'Mini-Missionaries' which are locals serving only for 2 weeks at a time. It's hard to train someone in their young teens, who hasn't been through an MTC and is only going to be out for 2 weeks. I much prefer the full-time Elders. My new full-time companion WAS Elder Stephan, from Utah, but he arrived with health issues and after 4 days, he was in so much pain, he was honorably sent home for

medical attention. He came with a broken rib and had no idea how it happened. Like me, his visa did not arrive in a timely manner and he served in the Georgia Atlanta Mission for several weeks, the same place I served while waiting for my visa. We had a lot in common and I really enjoyed him, but he was in almost constant pain and the x-rays showed 2 cracks in one of his ribs and it was thought prudent to send him home for better medical attention. He worked so hard to get past the pain and to be a good missionary, but it was becoming a serious health issue for him. I rode with Elder Stephan and Pres del Castillo to the bus terminal when he left for home. On the way back, I told Pres del Castillo I was very comfortable in the mission owned 4 X 4 Toyota and he just laughed. We joked and visited like best friends. I have never had anything other than a serious conversation with him before. I told him it only took me 4 days to train my last companion and he laughed and said I did so well he was giving me another one to train right away. My new companion is Elder Ruben Cardoza, the Bishop's son. He is funny and pleasant but sleeps a lot because he is only 16 years old and has no mission experience. Yes, he is a 'Mini'.

I finally got to baptize Celina
Aquino. She has waited almost a year for
her birth certificate to arrive from
Buenos Aires so she could get married.
Then we were finally able to baptize her.
Three of her five children are members
and we are working with the other two and
hope they will soon be baptized as well.

We also baptized three other people on Saturday. It was such a great and spiritual experience. Pres. Del Castillo was present. We have two more baptisms set for Jan. 16th.

We are at the height of summer here and it is so hot. Yesterday, it was 120 degrees and we can't keep our hair gel from running down our faces or keep sun screen on our faces. We just sweat it off. So I got a buzz haircut hoping it

will be cooler or at least eliminate part of the problem.

It was so nice to get to talk to family on Christmas day and to know that everyone is happy and doing well. I love Argentina and the Church is true! Love - Elder Oldner

Elder Isaac Standage (Micronesia Guam Mission) PO Box 2203 Kolonia, FM 96941 Pohnpei

It was so good to learn that Matthew got his mission call and I know he will really enjoy Idaho.

This new area of Pohnpei is really different from the work we did on Guam but it is all going well and the language is coming along. I have learned a basic prayer, an intro and a short testimony and I can read a little as well. I can now read both the sacrament prayers in church in Pohnpeian. Since there is only one active Melchezedik Priesthood holder here and he is serving as the Branch

President, we are like his acting counselors and since I don't really speak fluent Pohnpeian yet, it is mostly falling on my companion, Elder Larson. I don't have to teach seminary anymore because a senior couple that just arrived is now doing that. They only meet for class once a week and there are only 3 or 4 kids in class at any one time.

The mission does provide bikes for the elders here so we don't have to walk everywhere. They are mtn. bikes and we need them because there are lots of hills here in our area. We also have phones, but they are home phones. No cell phones here. The island is divided into 7 areas for missionary work and there are some smaller surrounding islands that are connected by a bridge/road and we also cover one of them in our area. We have frogs, snakes, bats, spiders and pigs on the island, that I have seen so far. The island of Pohnpei is a third world country. There are no 2 lane highways but they are paved, unlike the majority of the roads in Guam . They do have indoor plumbing but the only fresh (not salt) water is collected from the rain, so water is used very conservatively. The people here still dress pretty much by native traditions. Grass skirts are mostly worn. The elastic waist band is worn up under the arm pits, but it is pretty much as depicted in Nat. Geographic Magazines. They are good people and humble. I love them!

We had a bleach mishap. We don't do laundry at our house and have to transport it to the Laundromat. In the trip, the bottle of bleach leaked onto our dark clothes and I ruined a pair of black pants. It got on some other things, but some of those pants are only colorless now at the bottom and we just tuck those into our socks because of the bikes, etc.

We have met some of the kids serving in the Peace Corps here and have exchanged some pamphlets on learning the language and social customs, etc. They seemed nice.

We had a baptism scheduled for Dec. 19th but had to move it to the 26th because he was unable to come to church. Everyone else in his family are already members and he acts like he really wants to be baptized so I think it will work out for him.

The **Gila Valley Temple open house** has been set for 23 Apr, 2010 through 15 May, 2010. Dedication is set for 23 May, 2010. It will open for ordinances Monday, May 24th. This will be the third temple in Arizona and the 132nd operating temple worldwide.

The **Phoenix temple** planned for W. Pinnacle Peak Rd. near N. 51st Ave., adjacent to an existing LDS chapel, got the necessary zoning variance to begin construction. The Church has made concessions to pacify concerns of some of the neighbors opposing the construction of the temple, although not required to do so by law. The spire will be 60 feet shorter than the proposed Gilbert temple, the outside lighting will be ½ as bright as the Mesa temple and the lights will be turned off at 10 PM although the city allows them to be on until 11 PM. The exterior will be a muted white instead of a bright white stone, and the temple will be set back from neighboring back yards, five times more than was originally planned. The open house will be limited to 30 days and a reservation system for the visitors will be used to help manage parking.

The Vancouver, British Columbia, Canada temple open house will be held Apr. 9 thru Apr 24, 2010. Dedication will be May 2, 2010. This will be Canada's seventh temple and the first in British Columbia. Another temple to be built in Calgary, Alberta, was announced Oct 2008.
