Dear Dana Ward – This has been a busy but productive month here in Lett, on the island of Pohnpei. We were excited and then disappointed alternately, most of the month, for a couple we hope to baptize soon. They needed to get married before we could baptize them. We don't really have anything to do with the marriage part, but it was on and off several times and then they did not attend meetings for a bit and then showed up again. They were finally married by the Branch President last Saturday. It was a small affair with only the couple, 4 missionaries and 1 witness, but it was nice and they are married now. The goal now is their baptism, which hopefully, will be soon. We baptized a little 10 year old girl named Martha Soaz, a week ago. My companion baptized her and it was his first. He kindof panicked at the last minute and somehow lost hold of her but was so nervous about getting her completely under the water that he kept pushing her down and it just about scared her to death and she swallowed some water. He is such a good missionary and I really enjoy him. He is shy and lacks a lot of self confidence, which is very much a good description of me when I first entered the mission field. I think he just needs to be given a few challenges and I am sure he will take off. He really is a good Elder! It was a baptism we won't soon forget!

That was good news that Johnny Pace is officially in the mission field and I hope he is successful. It's really cool that he is learning Spanish.

I think it is insane what some people actually are willing to believe. I never cease to be surprised at just how lost the world really is when I hear about some of the doctrines and beliefs out there. I guess that is part of being a missionary – to help teach the true gospel and principles and correct some of those misquided beliefs.

I am glad folks at home are still attending the temple regularly. I look forward to the day I can attend the temple again, but with mixed feelings because it will mean that I am no longer in the

mission field.

I was happy to hear that Joseph conducted the recent Court of Honor. I think the only thing I ever conducted in my life before my mission, was the music in Priesthood meeting. It would have been painful, but so helpful to have had some practice at

conducting a meeting before I had no choice upon coming here to Nett. I survived and it is just another responsibility now, but I was positive I would die of a heart attack upon being told it would be a regular duty for me here.

We are still working with Emwin, one of our investigators. He is so close. He is still struggling with chewing beetle nut and he and we are hopeful he will succeed and be able to be baptized in another few weeks. Transfers will be this next week again, and as usual, we have hopes and fears of possible changes. Who knows what new or continued experiences await us? My best wishes from Pohnpei. I am still currently in Wichita Falls. I came here to become a crew chief for a B1 Bomber or pretty much an airplane mechanic. I have been here since April 29th and should be leaving soon to my first duty base in Rapid City, South Dakota, at Ellsworth AFB.

Training was pretty easy and I kept my GPA in the 90's. It involved a ton of



powerpoint presentations about how my plane specifically is designed and works and where every thing is and why its where it is and all the electrical and hydraulics and basic air craft procedures like engine start up and refueling and oil servicing. My Mom flew out to see me from Mesa. I had horrible chest pains and a high temp of 104 for a while. They did a lot of tests but never found anything. My MTL's (military training leaders) pulled some strings and got me caught up so I could at least graduate without having to wait for the next class. I was on medical hold for awhile but am just waiting on orders, kind of like a mission call, saying when and where I'm going. That's pretty much everything for now.

I'm glad everyone is doing good on their missions! It was nice to catch up on where they are all serving. Keep in touch. Tyler


#### **GETTING TO KNOW YOU BETTER!**

Tom and Edwina Dastrup are 'legends' in the old 19<sup>th</sup> and now Dana Ward. So - let us share some of the legend with you younger 'kids' of the fabulous Dana Ward! Tom was born in Reno, Nevada and grew up in different places in Nevada. His family moved to Glendale, California when he was a Jr. in high school and he graduated there in 1948. The Korean conflict was going on at the time so Tom joined the Air Force to fulfill his military obligation and because they had a good education program for their veterans. Tom was trained as an air craft mechanic and was assigned to Williams Field Air Base out in Gilbert.

Edwina Whiting was born in Provo, Utah but grew up in Holbrook, Az. When she was a Jr. in high school, her family moved to Mesa and she graduated from Mesa High School in 1950. She enrolled in Lambson Business College and met Tom at the Mezona Friday Night Dances and said she felt sorry for him because he was military and far from home. Edwina was engaged and her intended had just left for a mission but Tom had met him and promised to take care of her while he was gone. Tom prevailed and they were married in the Mesa temple in 1951. They celebrated their 59<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary on Aug. 31<sup>st</sup>.

Bulldozers and other large equipment have started work on installing utilities, streets and sidewalks in the block which will house the **Gilbert Temple** at Pecos and

Greenfield Roads. Final approval has been obtained for construction to begin on the temple structure.

A 'redesign' of the **Phoenix Temple** has been submitted by the Church. Although the Phoenix City Council approved the former design, many nearby neighbors of the building site have actively objected to the old design. The new design lowers the building height from 40 to 30 feet and the spire was changed from 86 to 90 feet in height. The new height complies with

all current zoning requirements. Parking spaces have been increased to 400. The Phoenix temple will not have a visitors center or feature pageants or Christmas lights. Construction will begin after the city issues a building permit.
